Acts 2:14, 36-41 (ESV)

¹⁴ But Peter, standing with the eleven, lifted up his voice and addressed them: "Men of Judea and all who dwell in Jerusalem, let this be known to you, and give ear to my words. ... ³⁶ Let all the house of Israel therefore know for certain that God has made him both Lord and Christ, this Jesus whom you crucified."

³⁷ Now when they heard this they were cut to the heart, and said to Peter and the rest of the apostles, "Brothers, what shall we do?" 38 And Peter said to them, "Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins, and you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit. ³⁹ For the promise is for you and for your children and for all who are far off, everyone whom the Lord our God calls to himself." ⁴⁰ And with many other words he bore witness and continued to exhort them, saying, "Save yourselves from this crooked generation." ⁴¹ So those who received his word were baptized, and there were added that day about three thousand souls.

¹⁷ And if you call on him as Father who judges impartially according to each one's deeds, conduct yourselves with fear throughout the time of your exile, ¹⁸ knowing that you were ransomed from the futile ways inherited from your forefathers, not with perishable things such as silver or gold, ¹⁹ but with the precious blood of Christ, like that of a lamb without blemish or spot. ²⁰ He was foreknown before the foundation of the world but was made manifest in the last times for the sake of you ²¹ who through him are believers in God, who raised him from the dead and gave him glory, so that your faith and hope are in God.

²² Having purified your souls by your obedience to the truth for a sincere brotherly love, love one another earnestly from a pure heart, ²³ since you have been born again, not of perishable seed but of imperishable, through the living and abiding word of God; ²⁴ for

Luke 24:13-35 (ESV)

¹³ That very day two of them were going to a village named Emmaus, about seven miles from Jerusalem, ¹⁴ and they were talking with each other about all these things that had happened. ¹⁵ While they were talking and discussing together, Jesus himself drew near and went with them.

¹⁶ But their eyes were kept from recognizing him. ¹⁷ And he said to them, "What is this conversation that you are holding with each other as you walk?" And they stood still, looking sad. 18 Then one of them, named Cleopas, answered him, "Are you the only visitor to Jerusalem who does not know the things that have happened there in these days?" 19 And he said to them, "What things?" And they said to him, "Concerning Jesus of Nazareth, a man who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people, ²⁰ and how our chief priests and rulers delivered him up to be condemned to death, and crucified him. ²¹ But we had hoped that he was the one to redeem Israel. Yes, and besides all this, it is now the third day since these things happened. ²² Moreover, some women of our company amazed us. They were at the tomb early in the morning, ²³ and when they did not find his body, they came back saying that they had even seen a vision of angels, who said that he was alive. ²⁴ Some of those who were with us went to the tomb and found it just as the women had said, but him they did not see." ²⁵ And he said to them, "O foolish ones, and slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have spoken! ²⁶ Was it not necessary that the Christ should suffer these things and enter into his glory?" ²⁷ And beginning with Moses and all the Prophets, he interpreted to them in all the Scriptures the things concerning himself.

²⁸ So they drew near to the village to which they were going. He acted as if he were going farther, ²⁹ but they urged him strongly, saying, "Stay with us, for it is toward evening and the day is now far spent." So he went in to stay with them. ³⁰ When he was at table with them, he took the bread and blessed and broke it and gave it to them. ³¹ And their eyes were opened, and they recognized him. And he vanished from their sight. ³² They said to each other, "Did not our hearts burn within us while he talked to us on the road, while he opened to us the Scriptures?" ³³ And they rose that same

hour and returned to Jerusalem. And they found the eleven and those who were with them gathered together, ³⁴ saying, "The Lord has risen indeed, and has appeared to Simon!" ³⁵ Then they told what had happened on the road, and how he was known to them in the breaking of the bread.

Verse: This is the Gospel of the Lord. Response: Praise to You, O Christ.

Sermon.

"The Word of the Lord Remains Forever"

1 Peter 1:24-25

24 "All flesh is like grass and all its glory like the flower of grass.The grass withers, and the flower falls.

²⁵ but the word of the Lord remains forever."

And this word is the good news that was preached to you.

He is Risen! He is Risen Indeed. Alleluia!

The rains of March and April have many of us cutting grass. The lush lands of Kentucky are verdant—or in other words, our grass is green and growing.

The land of Israel is not as verdant; in fact, the land is a wilderness. Yet, the rains of March bring streams in the desert and a splash of green. But their grass is fading.

Past the green grasses and wildflowers, the two disciples walked. The road from Jerusalem to Emmaus was very likely going down. And as they walked, they were talking about the events of the past. They spoke of their disappointment.

Luke 24:15 "While they were talking and discussing together, Jesus himself drew near and went with them. ¹⁶ But their eyes were kept from recognizing him."

They were not casual bystanders. Jesus the Christ was crucified. They would have known Jesus well. And Jesus, their hope, was now gone.

An ancient Christian story says Cleopas was the brother of Joseph and the brother-in-law of the Virgin Mary. "Mary of Cleopas," who stood by the cross with Jesus' mother, was the wife of this Emmaus disciple. Simeon, their son, a cousin to Jesus, would later become bishop in the Jerusalem Church.

Cleopas lived in Emmaus, some threescore furlongs, sixty stadia, or about seven and a half miles outside Jerusalem. Many think the other disciple walking with Jesus was Cleopas' son Simeon. These two walked together after the wretched week. They had crucified the Lord.

The stranger gently came alongside the two men. He asked about their topic as they walked and talked. They stopped, and stood, and looked, so sad. They spoke of their disappointment.

The seven and a half miles from Jerusalem to Emmaus looked out over the countryside. From November through March the rains from gray skies would turn the desert green. Streams in the desert would make the wilderness

bloom. Then from April through October, blue skies and dry winds would turn the landscape brown again. The Psalmist describes the sadness:

Ps 103:15 As for man, his days are like grass;
 he flourishes like a flower of the field;
 16 for the wind passes over it, and it is gone, and its place knows it no more.

And then there comes the refreshing joy:

Psalm 103:17 But the steadfast love of the Lord is from everlasting to everlasting on those who fear him,

and his righteousness to children's children,

¹⁸ to those who keep his covenant and remember to do his commandments.

Cleopas and the other disciple knew the Scriptures; yet, their eyes could not recognize the risen Lord. Their hopes crushed, they could not look up.

Luke 24:18 Cleopas, answered [Jesus], "Are you the only visitor to Jerusalem who does not know the things that have happened there in these days?" ¹⁹ And he said to them, "What things?" And they said to him, "Concerning Jesus of Nazareth, a man who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people, ²⁰ and how our chief priests and rulers delivered him up to be condemned to death, and crucified him. ²¹ But we had hoped that he was the one to redeem Israel. Yes, and besides all this, it is now the third day since these things happened. ²² Moreover, some women of our company amazed us. They were at the tomb early in the morning, ²³ and when they did not find his body, they came back saying that they had even seen a vision of angels, who said that he was alive. ²⁴ Some of those who were with us went to the tomb and found it just as the women had said, but him they did not see."

Centuries before the coming of the Christ, Isaiah could see the salvation of all people. Yet, so close to the Savior, these disciples could not see. Isaiah gives voice to their blindness:

Isaiah 40:6 A voice says, "Cry!"

And I said, "What shall I cry?"

All flesh is grass,

and all its beauty is like the flower of the field.

- ⁷ The grass withers, the flower fades when the breath of the Lord blows on it; surely the people are grass.
- ⁸ The grass withers, the flower fades, but the word of our God will stand forever.

Luke 24:25 [Jesus] said to them, "O foolish ones, and slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have spoken! ²⁶ Was it not necessary that the Christ should suffer these things and enter into his glory?" ²⁷ And beginning with Moses and all the Prophets, he interpreted to them in all the Scriptures the things concerning himself.

We hear the Scriptures today, and our cold hearts of stone are melted in the flame of the Gospel. Faith, kindled by the Holy Spirit, is drawn to the Lord who looks like He is going away. But, the disciples did bid Him stay, and, He stayed! He was made known in the breaking of the bread. His real presence calmed their fears and restored their faith. Such is Holy Communion today.

The grass is cut today and burned tomorrow. But, He is here to stay. Though He vanished from the Emmaus home, He is Risen! He is risen indeed! His Resurrection fills our hearts with hope. He is poured out on the cross, poured upon us in Baptism, and poured in with and under the cup. He is Risen! He is Risen indeed! Alleluia!

Peter says of Him:

^{1 Peter 1:20} He was foreknown before the foundation of the world but was made manifest in the last times for the sake of you ²¹ who through him are believers in God, who raised him from the dead and gave him glory, so that your faith and hope are in God.

²⁴ "All flesh is like grass and all its glory like the flower of grass.

The grass withers, and the flower falls, ²⁵ but the word of the Lord remains forever."

And this word is the good news that was preached to you.

He is Risen! He is Risen Indeed! Alleluia!

Psalm 116 (ESV)

- ¹I love the Lord, because he has heard my voice and my pleas for mercy.
- ² Because he inclined his ear to me, therefore I will call on him as long as I live.
- ³ The snares of death encompassed me; the pangs of Sheol laid hold on me; I suffered distress and anguish.
- ⁴ Then I called on the name of the Lord: "O Lord, I pray, deliver my soul!"
- ⁵ Gracious is the Lord, and righteous; our God is merciful.
- ⁶The Lord preserves the simple; when I was brought low, he saved me.
- ⁷ Return, O my soul, to your rest; for the Lord has dealt bountifully with you.
- 8 For you have delivered my soul from death, my eyes from tears, my feet from stumbling;
- ⁹ I will walk before the Lord in the land of the living.

Almighty God the Father, through Your only-begotten Son, Jesus Christ, You have overcome death and opened the gate of everlasting life to us. Grant that we, who celebrate with joy the day of our Lord's resurrection, may be raised from the death of sin by Your life-giving Spirit; through Jesus Christ, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.
