The First Reading.

Acts 3:13-15, 17-19 (ESV)

¹³ The God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob, the God of our fathers, glorified his servant Jesus, whom you delivered over and denied in the presence of Pilate, when he had decided to release him. ¹⁴ But you denied the Holy and Righteous One, and asked for a murderer to be granted to you, ¹⁵ and you killed the Author of life, whom God raised from the dead. To this we are witnesses. ...

¹⁷ "And now, brothers, I know that you acted in ignorance, as did also your rulers. ¹⁸ But what God foretold by the mouth of all the prophets, that his Christ would suffer, he thus fulfilled. ¹⁹ Repent therefore, and turn back, that your sins may be blotted out."

Versicle: But Thou, O Lord, have mercy upon us.

Answer. Thanks be to Thee, O Lord.

The Epistle.

1 Corinthians 11:23-26 (ESV)

²³ For I received from the Lord what I also delivered to you, that the Lord Jesus on the night when he was betrayed took bread, ²⁴ and when he had given thanks, he broke it, and said, "This is my body, which is for you. Do this in remembrance of me." ²⁵ In the same way also he took the cup, after supper, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me." ²⁶ For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

Versicle: But Thou, O Lord, have mercy upon us.

Answer. Thanks be to Thee, O Lord.

The Holy Gospel.

John 21:1-14 (ESV)

¹ After this Jesus revealed himself again to the disciples by the Sea of Tiberias, and he revealed himself in this way. ² Simon Peter, Thomas (called the Twin), Nathanael of Cana in Galilee, the sons of Zebedee, and two others of his disciples were together. ³ Simon Peter said to them, "I am going fishing." They said to him, "We will go with you." They went out and got into the boat, but that night they caught nothing.

⁴ Just as day was breaking, Jesus stood on the shore; yet the disciples did not know that it was Jesus. ⁵ Jesus said to them, "Children, do you have any fish?" They answered him, "No." ⁶ He said to them, "Cast the net on the right side of the boat, and you will find some." So they cast it, and now they were not able to haul it in, because of the quantity of fish. ⁷ That disciple whom Jesus loved therefore said to Peter, "It is the Lord!" When Simon Peter heard that it was the Lord, he put on his outer garment, for he was stripped for work, and threw himself into the sea. ⁸ The other disciples came in the boat, dragging the net full of fish, for they were not far from the land, but about a hundred yards off.

⁹ When they got out on land, they saw a charcoal fire in place, with fish laid out on it, and bread. ¹⁰ Jesus said to them, "Bring some of the fish that you have just caught." ¹¹ So Simon Peter went aboard and hauled the net ashore, full of large fish, 153 of them. And although there were so many, the net was not torn. ¹² Jesus said to them, "Come and have breakfast." Now none of the disciples dared ask him, "Who are you?" They knew it was the Lord. ¹³ Jesus came and took the bread and gave it to them, and so with the fish. ¹⁴ This was now the third time that Jesus was revealed to the disciples after he was raised from the dead.

Versicle: But Thou, O Lord, have mercy upon us.

Answer. Thanks be to Thee, O Lord.

HOMILY:

Thy Kingdom come.

What does this mean? The kingdom of God certainly comes by itself without our prayer, but we pray in this petition that it may come to us also.

How does God's kingdom come? God's kingdom comes when our heavenly Father gives us His Holy Spirit, so that by His grace we believe His holy Word and lead godly lives here in time and there in eternity.

Martin Luther's Small Catechism CPH

John 21:14 "This was now the third time that Jesus was revealed to the disciples after he was raised from the dead."

The previous two times we saw the risen Jesus, He showed himself to the disciples on the first day of the week, on a Sunday. So Peter on this third Sabbath may have had the bright idea to stick around. But no, Peter is a fisherman. And fishermen go fishing ... on a Sunday.

Peter invited six of his friends to be in the boat from Saturday sundown to Sunday sunrise. Peter plus the six would make it seven who started out at the end of the seventh day. This was not a violation of the Sabbath rest, for the sun had gone down on Saturday. They were fishing all night on the first day of the week. And they caught nothing.

Just as the day was breaking they heard a stranger on the shore calling: "Have you caught any fish?" I think of the many times that I've walked past a fisherman and asked the same question. And they have given the same answer: "No fish yet."

From the shore, He offered advice: "Try the right side of the boat." Immediately, at daybreak the right side was swarming with the swimming. Déjà vu. Luke had captured the earlier scene: 4 "And when he had finished speaking, he said to Simon, "Put out into the deep and let down your nets for a catch." 5 And Simon answered, "Master, we toiled all night and took nothing! But at your word I will let down the nets." 6 And when they had done this, they enclosed a large number of fish, and their nets were breaking." Luke 5:4-6 (ESV)

They have seen this before! So many fish! "It is the Lord!" Peter, who once walked on water, is again out of the boat and in the drink! He threw himself in with the miraculous catch.

Centuries before Jonah was out of the boat; sailors threw him into the deep. A fish swam Jonah to shore. And on the third day he was up out of the belly and onto the beach. God said, "Go and tell", tell the nations at Ninevah. Tell them, "God will destroy and God will spare."

Jesus fulfilled the prophesy of Jonah. Matthew tells of this good news: ³⁸ "Then some of the scribes and Pharisees answered him, saying, "Teacher, we wish to see a sign from you." ³⁹ But he answered them, "An evil and adulterous generation seeks for a sign, but no sign will be given to it except the sign of

the prophet Jonah. ⁴⁰ For just as Jonah was three days and three nights in the belly of the great fish, so will the Son of Man be three days and three nights in the heart of the earth." Matthew 12:38-40 (ESV)

Centuries after Jonah, God would destroy and God would spare. He gave His only Son up for us all. He destroyed sin and death in the pierced body of His Son. Christ Jesus lay in the belly of the earth. And on the third day, the earth would find Him on the shore. This is the third time the disciples have seen the Lord. And on this third time, Jesus is on the shore. And we are spared.

Peter recognized the Lord on the shore. And Peter went into the water after Jesus. One hundred yards later Peter came up on to the shore. Jesus was before him, with a fire for warmth; and fish roasting; and daily bread, like manna from heaven. This was the First day's breakfast. Jesus makes Himself known to the seven at breakfast. There is some fish, symbol of a Christian, and the breaking of the bread. And then he tells Peter: "Simon, son of John, do you love me more than these?" He said to him, "Yes, Lord; you know that I love you." He said to him, "Feed my lambs." John 20:15 (ESV) Peter would feed them the good news: Jesus is risen! He is risen indeed. See he has flesh and blood. And He eats with them.

Bring more fish! Why? To feed more than seven. From this eighth day of new creation, Jesus will feed 153 and me. This is more than common chromosomes. Adam's heritage was harmful for his sin separated us from God. Our ancestry was one huge rebellious man. And yet, here is a new Man, begotten of God, born of woman, dead for sin, risen for the world, and sitting on the shore feeding the followers and offering more.

Peter pulled the net ashore. 153 large fish was the count. The net was not torn. Why 153? It's a mystery; but, the math is as satisfying as the mouthful. If one stacks the catch with seventeen fish on the bottom and one fish on the top, then, one would have a triangle of St, Peter's fish 17 tilapia high. Seeing a three sided equilateral triangle, Augustine makes a point to say the 153 fish triangle shows the three on one God who in Christ has gathered all the nations and saved them by His Rising on the third day. That's quite the Easter breakfast. Christ is Risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia! Amen.

Offerings to God in thanksgiving for your life and your daily bread may be sent to your house of worship.
